In this vein, welcome to everyone the Lyme School, a familiar place for some of you, and a new opportunity for all of us to create a world we dream can exist.

Parents: Never Perseverate-Communicate!

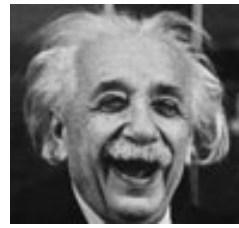
Don't lose sleep or worry needlessly; together we can work on a solution.
